REQUEST FOR REVISION OF THE PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE AND POSTPONEMENT OF PROJECT INCEPTION DATE: WORLD FOOD PROGRAMME (EL SALVADOR, HONDURAS)

Background

- 1. The Adaptation Fund Board (the Board) during its thirty-ninth meeting, approved a five-year project titled "Strengthening the adaptive capacities of climate-vulnerable communities in the Goascorán watershed of El Salvador and Honduras through integrated community-based adaptation practices and services" in El Salvador and Honduras, submitted by the World Food Programme (WFP) for a requested amount of US\$12,048,300.00 (Decision B.39/35).
- 2. The objective of the project is to strengthen the climate change adaptive capacity of vulnerable households in the degraded transboundary watershed of Goascorán, across El Salvador and Honduras by providing communities with integrated climate risk management tools and services that enhance their resilience to climate variability and change. The project will support the adoption and dissemination of traditional and innovative climate-resilient practices and technologies within a gender-transformative integrated approach.
- 3. As mandated by the decision, an agreement was prepared and signed between the Board and WFP on 1 February 2023. The project inception was estimated to take place on 7 August 2023.
- 4. On 11 August 2023, WFP submitted a first notification of delay of project inception date from 7 August 2023 to 1 February 2024. On 2 February 2024, WFP submitted a second notification of delay of project inception from 1 February 2024 to 1 August 2024. Both these requests for a postponement of project inception date, were approved by the secretariat, in line with Decision B.34/45 and with provisions set forth in the Policy for Project Delays.
- 5. On 18 July 2024, WFP submitted a third notification of delay of project inception, postponed to 30 September 2024 with an estimated project completion date on 29 September 2029. As per Board Decision B.36/35, an implementing entity whose project or programme experiences, due to exceptional circumstances, a significant delay in inception (exceeding 12 months from the standard inception target of six months from the first cash transfer) is requested to submit to the Board, through the Adaptation Fund Board secretariat, a request for revision of the project implementation schedule, including a revised inception date for intersessional consideration.
- 6. The reasons for this request, as outlined in the memo shared by WFP, are due to an unforeseen delay related to the institutional periods required for the approval and signature process of the Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) and Memorandum of Understandings (MOUs) with the Executing Entities (EEs) that in the case of El Salvador required internal approval of the signatories. The review and adjustment processes of the SOP and MOUs with the EEs and securing signatures following the approval of changes in implementation arrangements requested by the Secretariat of Natural Resources and Environment (SERNA), EE in Honduras, took longer than anticipated. An additional two months are needed to complete the approval process and signature of agreements with both governments.
- 7. In both countries, WFP reports active collaboration with relevant authorities to expedite preparations for the inception workshop, which is scheduled to take place no later than September 30th. Additionally, WFP is intensifying communication and coordination efforts, establishing regular check-ins with stakeholders to address any emerging challenges promptly.

Secretariat's review of the request

- 8. Following a review of the request by the secretariat and considering the explanation provided by WFP, the secretariat is of the view that this request for a revision of the project implementation schedule (Annex 2), including a two-months postponement of project inception is justified. As evidenced by the memo provided by WFP (Annex 1), it is noted that this request would allow sufficient time for the project to finalize the necessary steps to start project implementation.
- 9. Finally, the secretariat acknowledges that this delay in project/programme delay request has been agreed with the Executing Entities, and the Designated Authorities were notified, in accordance with the Adaptation Fund Policy for Project/Programme Delays, as specified in Annex 1.

Recommendation

10. The Board may consider and decide to approve the request for revision of the project implementation schedule, including a postponement of project inception date from 1 August 2024 to 30 September 2024, for the project "Strengthening the adaptive capacities of climate-vulnerable communities in the Goascorán watershed of El Salvador and Honduras through integrated community-based adaptation practices and services" in El Salvador and Honduras, as requested by WFP.

 Reasons/ justification for delay in the project's/programme's inception and the number of months of delay from the project approval date

The project inception has encountered an unforeseen delay, mainly because of the necessary institutional periods required for the approval and signature process of the Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) and Memorandum of Understandings (MOUs) with the Executing Entities that in the case of El Salvador required internal approval of the signatories.

The complex review and adjustment processes of the Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) and Memorandum of Understanding (MOUs) with the Executing Entities and securing signatures following the approval of changes in implementation arrangements requested by SERNA, has taken longer than anticipated. However, there is steady progress:

- SERNA requested changes in implementation arrangements and WFP submitted this request for AF approval on April 8, 2024.
- AF notified the approval of the requested project implementation amendment on June 27, 2024; allowing to finalize the MOUs and SOP without altering project activities, budget, or implementation plan.
- WFP and executing entities have completed MoUs and SOP; nevertheless, legal
 procedures require that the final versions of both documents be signed together.
 Approval from Adaptation Fund was necessary to finalize the SOP and MARN's internal
 approval process to obtain "full powers of attorney" takes two months.

Therefore, an additional two months are needed to complete the approval process and signature of agreements with both governments. The new proposed start date is September 30, 2024. Please refer to Annex 1 for the detailed milestones and dates for the next two months.

2. Approaches/ mitigation measures to ensure the start of implementation.

To ensure that the project starts within the proposed timeframe, the following measures will be considered:

- Having obtained approval from the Adaptation Fund Board of the implementation
 arrangements requested by SERNA, the binational SOPs and MOUs approval and
 signature processes in both countries will be finalized. The government of El Salvador
 needs to ensure that all necessary steps involved in the power of attorney process are
 completed within a maximum timeframe of two months. This condition is designed to
 ensure that the project's execution start is devoid of any associated risks or delays.
- In both countries, WFP is actively collaborating with relevant authorities to expedite the preparations for the inception workshop, which will be scheduled to take place on September 30th at the latest.

Additionally, WFP is intensifying communication and coordination efforts, establishing regular check-ins with stakeholders to address any emerging challenges promptly.

Challenges (in addition to those mentioned in section 1) that may extend the project/program completion date)

Other factors that could affect the timely implementation and achievement of project objectives by the completion date may include unforeseen regulatory changes, shifts in political landscapes, or external factors related to extreme weather events.

WFP is committed to diligently working with both MARN in El Salvador and SERNA in Honduras to ensure effective cooperation and enable the project to meet its objectives according to the approved work plan. This approach will involve comprehensive coordination with key stakeholders in both Governments and in the binational watershed.
